## Spring in the Forest: Native Wildflowers



### Woodland Garden Plant Identification Guide

**White Trillium** (*Trillium grandiflorum*) - Exactly 3 leaves, each at 45 degree angle from each other. One flower per plant, with three white petals.



**Spring Beauty** (*Claytonia virginica*) - Very small white flowers with pink lines on petals. Five petals per flower. Leaves long and narrow: shoestring-like.



**Virginia Bluebell** (*Mertensia virginica*) - Cluster of blue or pink, drooping, bell-shaped flowers. Very large, hairy oval leaves up to 18 inches long.



**Wild Stonecrop** (*Sedum ternatum*) - Low growing plant. Leaves round, fleshy and succulent-like. Spreading branches of white flowers, each with four petals.



**Wild Blue Phlox** (*Phlox divaricata*) - Clusters of pink, purple, or blue flowers with five petals. Simple round leaves located opposite to each other on the stem.



**Jacob's Ladder** (*Polemonium reptans*) - Clusters of blue, five-petaled flowers. Rows of opposite, oval leaves about 1 inch long. Green pods will remain after flowers drop.



**Bloodroot** (*Sanguinaria canadensis*) - White flower with yellow stamens, about 2 inches across. One round leaf with very deep lobes. Leaves often unfurl after the flowers.



**Wild Geranium** (*Geranium maculatum*) - Pink-purple flowers with five petals. Leaves roughly hand shaped, with five long 'fingers,' or lobes.



**Golden Ragwort** (*Packera aurea*) - Clusters of yellow sunflower-like flowers on stems 1-2 feet tall. Round leaves at base with fine teeth along the edges.



**Goldenseal** (*Hydrastis canadensis*) - Large, fuzzy, umbrella-like leaves. One small flower per plant with no petals, but about 40 white, stalk-like stamens.



**Herb Robert** (*Geranium robertianum*) - Small, pink, five-petaled flowers. Very hairy leaves and stems, often reddish in color. Leaves are finely divided.



**Wood Poppy** (*Stylophorum diphylllum*) - All parts of flower are yellow, 4 petals. Leaves about 6 inches long with several deep divisions and lobes along the edges.



**Early saxifrage** (*Micranthes virginiana*) - White flowers on a tall, very hairy stem. Toothed leaves only at base of stem. Fragrant flowers with five petals each.



**Bleeding Heart** (*Dicentra eximia*) - Pink, heart shaped flowers that dangle from stems. Delicate, finely divided leaves.



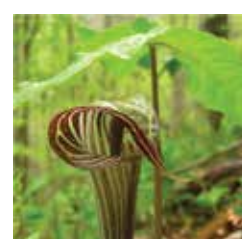
**Largeflower Bellwort** (*Uvularia grandiflora*) - Drooping yellow flowers. Oval shaped leaves that 'clasp' the stem, fully wrapping around it.



**Cutleaf toothwort** (*Cardamine concatenata*) - Clusters of very small white flowers with 4 petals each. Long, narrow leaves with coarse teeth on the edges.



**Toadshade** (*Trillium sessile*) - Exactly 3 leaves, often with mottled dark spots. One closed up red flower per plant. Often forms dense clumps.



**Jack in the Pulpit** (*Arisaema triphyllum*) - Unique green to red cup-shaped flower. Exactly 3 smooth edged oval leaves arranged in a T shape.
